

Academic progress continues

## DISTRICT CELEBRATES "EXCELLENT WITH DISTINCTION"

Westerville City School District (WCSD) officials during the past two years pledged that continued community support would help maintain the excellence for which the district is known. Results from the latest state report card confirmed that the district delivered on that pledge, and then some.

Westerville City Schools met 25 of 26 state indicators on the 2010 State Report Card and earned the rating of "Excellent with Distinction," the highest designation awarded by the Ohio Department of Education.

The district barely missed meeting all 26 report card indicators. The percent proficient in eighth-grade science came in at 74.7 percent, which is three-tenths of a percent shy of meeting the state standard of 75 percent.

"I'm pleased to announce to our community that the Westerville City School District has taken the next step in its improvement efforts and achieved the state's highest rating of Excellent with Distinction," said Superintendent Dr. Dan Good. "Our continued success is the result of the hard work of our faculty and staff, as well as the continued involvement of our families and support of our community. There's always room for improvement, so we will continue to make the adjustments necessary to raise student achievement and remain fiscally responsible while doing so."

The district also earned a Performance Index score of 100.8, which is up from last year's score of 99.9 and the highest score achieved by the district since the Performance Index was first reported in 2000-2001.

"A district's Performance Index score increases when more students score at the advanced, accelerated and proficient levels," explained Deputy Chief Academic Officer Karen McClellan. "We're proud that we've earned our highest score ever, which is a testament to the hard work that everyone has put into our improvement efforts."



McClellan said the district has a comprehensive strategy for approaching its improvement efforts, including examining its curriculum and instruction alignment; analyzing data; reviewing the resources provided to teachers; and providing focused professional development in these areas. The district also gives students a diagnostic practice test early in the school year to identify specific needs for each classroom, subject and individual student.

The district also has met Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) requirements for three consecutive years and its Value Added Rating over that same three-year period has been designated as "Above." This means that students have demonstrated academic growth that exceeds state-level growth expectations.

"While we're pleased that we have jumped into the state's highest rating of Excellent with Distinction, we continue to hold ourselves accountable for demonstrating improvement in every child," said Good. "We recognize that we still have individual students, student groups and schools that are not growing quickly enough to demonstrate Adequate

Yearly Progress. We will continue to focus our energies on nurturing a year's worth of growth in each student, not just aggregates of the student body."

District officials will use several strategies to improve AYP and continue to close achievement gaps, including:

- Analyzing district-wide data on student groups not meeting AYP,
- Analyzing individual school data on student groups not meeting AYP,
- Providing professional development and other resources as required by the results of these analyses.
- Working closely with principals to develop goals and action plans that specify how each school and the district will accomplish higher achievement for all students.

# All Three Westerville High Schools Make *Newsweek's* Best List

*Newsweek* annually picks the best high schools in the country based on the level to which students are challenged with advanced placement college-level courses and tests. Only 6 percent of all the public schools in the U.S. (just over 1,600 schools out of approximately 27,000) made the list. Westerville Central (rated 1,604), Westerville North (rated 1,129) and Westerville South (rated 1,358) were included among the 36 schools from the State of Ohio that made the list.

*Newsweek* editors arrive at their ratings by dividing by the number of seniors graduating in May or June by the total number of Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate or Cambridge (AICE) tests given at a school each year. All public schools that achieved a ratio of at least 1,000 (meaning they had as many tests in 2009 as they had graduates), made the list. Each list is based on the previous year's data, so the 2010 list reflects figures for 2009.

Westerville City Schools Superintendent Dr. Dan Good was pleased that all three Westerville high schools made the grade, saying, "Our entire community can take pride in the ranking of Westerville Central, North and South in the nation's top high schools. It is the support of citizens that comprise our school district that allows our faculty and staff to provide the right conditions for learning. They have helped us maintain high quality

education, and so this honor belongs to them. Congratulations, to the families and friends of the Westerville City School District."

Westerville's high school principals commended students and staff, and vowed to continue to make positive strides in all areas to ensure that each student in every building experiences academic success.

Westerville North High School principal Kurt Yancey said, "The Westerville North learning community is fortunate to have the opportunity to be included on the prestigious list of America's Best High Schools for 2010. Our mission is to ensure our students are learning each and every day and this distinction reflects the hard work and dedication of our students, staff, and families to meet this goal. We are very proud of our students' ability to excel both in and out of the classroom and we will continue our work toward higher achievement for all during the upcoming school year."

Westerville South High School principal Steve Andersson said, "South High School can be proud of the good work it does to prepare its students at the highest levels for 21st century global living. Truly these students enter the world well prepared for anything. While inclusion on the *Newsweek* list is flattering, the real reward is the pleasure of knowing that the work we do at South every day leads our students to such success."

Westerville Central High School principal Todd Spinner concluded, "It is an honor to be included in the list of America's Best High Schools 2010. The staff at Westerville Central High School truly provides our students with a top quality education. Central is an educational institution where students and faculty members can come to promote learning and independence through relationships, relevance and rigor. We are fortunate to have a very supportive community, superintendent, board of education and central office staff."
